NSPCC – Protect and Respect

Summary:

The NSPCC East London Protect and Respect Sexual Exploitation Service is based in the London borough of Tower Hamlets and covers the Newham area. The service aims to work with young people who are at risk of, have previously been or are currently being sexually exploited. The service works with young people who are both UK born or who have been trafficked externally and/or internally for the purposes of sexual exploitation.

Eligibility criteria:

- 11-19 years of age
- Male or Female
- The young person must be vulnerable to sexual exploitation or have experienced some form of sexual exploitation
- The young person must have some level of motivation to engage (however limited)
- The young person does not need to have insight into the associated risk or the concerns linked to the possible sexual exploitation

Project details:

We work with the young person over a 6 month period; the first month of which is spent undertaking an assessment of risk and need, carried out by specialist practitioners who have been trained to work with young people who have been sexually exploited. Once the assessment has been completed, time is spent engaging the young person directly using a variety of methods such as one to one work, therapeutic support and group sessions. The service is confidential. We aim to see the young person on a weekly/fortnightly basis, and have a duty of care to see a young person a minimum of every 28 days. We work in a multidisciplinary way alongside other services. The aim is that the young person will have significantly reduced their vulnerability to sexual exploitation by securing a safer environment and/or a more stable lifestyle. They should also have a greater insight into sexual exploitation and the grooming process as well as become more resilient to sexual exploitation.

Young Women's Advocate Project

The Young Women and Girls' Advocate works with young women aged between 11-25 years, who have experienced or are at risk of sexual violence. The Advocate aims to provide weekly informal 1-to-1 support to high risk young women, such as girls involved in 'gangs' or girls under 14, while consulting with professionals on other cases.

To be eligible for 1-to-1 work with the Young Women and Girls' Advocate:

- ❖ The young woman must live, attend school, or access services in Newham, Tower Hamlets, Barking & Dagenham, or Waltham Forest.
- ❖ The young woman must be between the ages 11-18.
- ❖ The young woman must have experienced sexual violence including but not limited to sexual exploitation, rape, 'gang' sexual involvement, prostitution and trafficking.

The Advocate's work will be based on specific issues relevant to each young woman, which will be agreed with her, allowing her to have control over the service and to engage voluntarily. The Advocate can offer both practical and emotional support to a young woman, including promoting her needs to the professionals working with her. The Advocate will also try to reduce the risks in a young woman's life and increase the protective factors around her. If a young woman wishes to report a crime of sexual violence, she will be supported throughout the criminal justice process by her Advocate. Where offending behaviour is identified, the Advocate will work proactively to encourage the young woman to engage in positive activities within her community and support her to understand how sexual violence has shaped her experiences.

The Advocate can address topics such as:

- Safe relationships recognising abuse
- ❖ Self-esteem/ confidence knowledge of consent and rights
- Managing risks/ safety planning without blame
- ❖ Sexual health support attending clinics/ accessing contraception



- Identity/ values including attitudes to sexual violence within community
- Trauma work coping mechanisms (including self-harm) and recognising emotions
- Gang' involvement sexual violence/exploitation in groups

The Young Women's Advocate can also deliver group work with 11-25 year olds are who are at risk of sexual violence (as well as those that have experienced sexual violence). The topics covered are as above but each group will be tailored to the needs of the individuals referred. The group aims to increase young women's safety through developing their knowledge of sexual violence, their rights and the support available to them. Each course of group work will run for 6 weeks with each session lasting 1-2 hours. Referrals are accepted for groups up to 10 young women.

NIA provides a woman-centred approach and endeavours to help young women to question the role of women and themselves in society. The Advocate is independent of statutory services.

Our Rape Crisis Service provides free, confidential specialist help for women and girls who have been raped or experienced any other form of sexual violence. Our services are for women of all ages including young women over the age of 14, whatever the assault and whenever it occurred.

We understand how difficult it is to take the first step, but when you feel ready, we are here to help. Rape is never a woman's fault. The women who work and volunteer at Rape Crisis London will offer you confidential and independent support. Services include emotional and practical support, one-to-one counselling, group support and advocacy. We know that men and boys are raped and sexually assaulted and so suffer the same traumas that women do. The London Black Women's Project (LBWP) formerly Newham Asian Women's Project

Project: Aware

The project focuses on safety, survival and recovery of BMER women and girls aged 11 up to 24, who may have experienced or you suspect are at risk of:

- Sexual exploitation/grooming
- Sexual harassment
- Bullying and sexual abuse
- Gangs and abuse
- Domestic abuse (Physical, emotional, financial and sexual)
- Harmful practices such as forced marriages and FGM

Project Aware delivers advocacy and support to young women through:

- One to one work (weekly 50mins sessions)- tailored to the issues that may arise for this young person. This will be for 10 sessions
- Small support group work (once a week for 6 weeks)
- ❖ Facilitating outreach programmes, schools programme and other activity programmes for advocacy and awareness to young people. For instance running workshops for PHCSE on domestic violence, grooming and sexual exploitation, forced marriage, etc.

The aim of the project is to empower young women and challenge attitudes around normalisation of gender based violence by supporting them to:

- Identify early warning signs of abuse
- Voice abuse that may be happening to them or has happened



- Supporting them through disclosure processes
- Uphold their rights to actively participate in shaping their own lives and supporting them to engage in decisions made about their lives and where their views, needs and feelings are at the core of those decisions.

Sessions are delivered at a convenient and safe location in their borough (Redbridge, Newham and Tower Hamlets), usually at their school/college/university or identified safe space, but they are also welcome to meet at our LBWP office on Barking Road, Newham.

LBWP have also redesigned their work to ensure that BAMER young women and girls who identify themselves as Lesbian, Bisexual or transgender and have access to our dedicated services and that we have better outreach with them while ensuring safe space for this work to happen.
